

What is Sports Premium?

The government is providing additional funding of £150 million per annum for academic years 2013 to 2014 and 2014 to 2015 to improve the provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport - will be allocated to primary school head teachers. This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools. Eligible schools Funding for schools will be calculated by reference to the number of primary-aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11), as recorded in the annual schools census in January 2013. Purpose of funding Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Evaluating Impact:

PE Subject Leader Nick Carter has evaluated the Impact that the Sports Premium funding has had on the 2014/15 academic year.

RED – target not achieved. School working towards ways of improving/implementing or changing the target completely for 2015/16

YELLOW – target partly achieved. School will now consider how this can be moved forward and improved in 2015/16 academic year

GREEN – target fully achieved. Highlights the positive impact this had had, and the huge benefits for staff, children and school sport and PE at Woodmancote. New targets will now be put in place for 2015/16 academic year.

Targeted support for identified children, enabling them to improve fitness levels within a supportive, yet challenging structure (Ever 6, SEN, Girls, Gifted and Talented)

Range of opportunities put into place to engage specific groups of children in order to raise participation levels.

Pupil feedback from identified groups is positive

- Member of staff working closely with AFA children to encourage participation in school clubs
- Pupil conferencing and pupil voice surveys analysed to identify the barriers stopping children from participating in sport.
- Consider possibility of using money to provide suitable clothing (specialist equipment) for children which are unable to provide this themselves (possible targeted children)
- Investigate possibility of inviting parents to the last session of the term to see what their children have been learning about and how they can nurture this out of school time.
- Encourage parental support at school sports based events
- Continue Intra school competition football /netball/hockey to ensure involvement of every child, build Team Spirit and competitive confidence even with those not in external teams
- Offering less competitive clubs to encourage participation such as Frisbee
- Play leaders in year 6 offered to encourage cross age participation in a range of lunchtime sport based activities.

Clothing: £200

AFA Champions (DG and MS) encouraged AFA (Achievement for All) children to take part in school clubs.

Successful first attempt at this – no data for 2014/15. NC to gather data next year

Sport Premium/Pupil Premium funding allowed school to buy PE kit and clothing for particular groups of children (eg shinpads for football club)

No intra-school sports (Level 1) arranged in 2014/15 other than Sports Day. NC/MS to consider how AFA/PP groups

Less competitive clubs set up – Chess Club, Creative Writing Club
